Divan Peterson lives in a remote area called Green Village where the community faces a lot of challenges.

When he joined the training course, he shared with us his concerns about being an unemployed father of a son with a medical condition. He wanted to use his creativity to change his cycle of poverty.

Attending the 'Give Yourself a Job' training course made him realise that he had talents, and the ability to put them to work. When asked to prepare for an entrepreneurial expo, he created woodwork items from cast-offs that he picked up in his neighbourhood, and fashioned a light using a disused baby feeding cup.

Other enthusiastic participants were: Wilmar Koordom who is making items from recycled wire, and mosaic work from broken beer bottles; and Nicola Sneuwel who uses bits and pieces to create new jewellery to sell.

Unemployment is one of the biggest problems that we face in South



Africa. Helping people to identify earning opportunities in their own communities, and training them to build up and maintain their own 'small business' is an important step towards the solution.

It may be 'one person at a time', but every individual able to earn their own income is significant – as is every individual who supports this programme. Thank you for being an individual who recognises the importance of 'Give Yourself a Job'.
